Professor Paul Thomas AM received undergraduate degrees at the University of Wales, Aberystwyth, and a research MA from Loughborough University before coming to Australia in 1976, where he received a PhD from the University of Queensland. In March 1994, he became Planning President for the University of the Sunshine Coast, the first university to be developed on a greenfield site for a quarter of a century. On 1 January 1996, Professor Thomas became the University's inaugural Vice-Chancellor. In 2007, he was honored with an Order of Australia medal for services to higher education and the establishment of the University of the Sunshine Coast. He is also a Fellow of the Australian College of Educators and a recipient of a Rotary International Paul Harris Fellowship.

Leading the Change Agenda: Transforming Education from the Inside Out



Professor Scott Bowman

Deputy-Vice-Chancellor, James Cook University

Professor Bowman worked as a senior radiographer in a number of hospitals in London before becoming a student teacher at Guys Hospital Radiography Education Centre. He became a principal lecturer at South Bank University when the centre at Guys amalgamated with that university. He went on to become Head of the Department of Radiography and Imaging Sciences at the University College of St Martin. He was appointed foundation Dean of the Faculty of Health Science and Community at St Martins before moving to Australia to take up the position of Head of the School of Medical Radiations at Charles Sturt University. At Charles Sturt University he later became the foundation Head of the School of Clinical Sciences, before moving to the University of South Australia as Dean of the Whyalla Campus and the foundation Director of Regional Engagement. From here he moved to his present position at JCU. Professor Bowman has also lectured for the Open University in the UK and been external examiner and advisor to many universities including Kings College (London), the University of Derby (UK), Kingston University (UK) and Monash University (Melbourne).

Believing that well-qualified graduates are the biggest contribution universities can make to the modern economy, Professor Barber's primary focus is to further Flinders University's reputation for teaching and research excellence while exploring opportunities that will deliver the skills required by tomorrow's labour market, both in Australia and internationally. Professor Barber started his career as a Queen Elizabeth II Fellow at Australian National University's Department of Applied Mathematics. In 1984 he was appointed Professor of Mathematics and became Dean of the Faculty of Science in 1990. Professor Barber was appointed Pro Vice-Chancellor (Research) at the University of Western Australia in 1994 and in 2006, he became Group Executive, Information, Manufacturing and Minerals at Australia's premier research organisation, the CSIRO. Professor Barber was elected a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science in 1992 and served as Secretary, Science Policy from 2001 to 2005.
